accolades for creating, sculpting, and doing the voice-over for the Wicked Itch for Lanacane. Her TV work lead to sculpting for the toy industry and eventually to inventing. Maureen is co-inventor of the popular boys action figure line Sectaurs, manufactured by Coleco in 1985. She wrote the original story for Sectaurs and was commissioned by Coleco to write the treatment for the screenplay, Search for the Hyve. She served as creative consultant for the five part cartoon mini-series of Sectaurs also based on her treatment Search for the Hyve. She participated in virtually every phase of the production from voice casting, to music, to editing. She also is co-inventor of Boglins, released by Mattel at Toy Fair 1988.

Maureen has written numerous treatments for TV and film including several pilot concepts for Viacom. The Adventures of Melody Moon based on Maureen's original story was optioned by Lorimar Telepictures. Maureen's storytelling ability has led to several public speaking engagements including, the keynote address for the American Association of Arts Managers Conference.
