FROM THE DIRECTOR

Almost four years ago I went to see a friend in an Off-Off-Off Broadway show called Fat Kids on Fire. I support my friends in whatever they do, but I was hesitant. A show I had never heard of in a theater I had never heard of in a part of NYC I had never heard of. No matter what—I was there for support. The play was funny, heartwarming and just an overall great night at the theater. The playwright was Bekah Brunstetter. Her writing was a perfect combination of comedy and tragedy. I knew this was a name to keep an eye on, so I did. Whenever a production of one of her plays came around, no matter where it was, I went. She was beginning to make a name for herself in the NYC theater scene, with plays produced by The Atlantic and Roundabout Theatre companies. In the spring of 2011, Brunstetter was commissioned to write a play for Ars Nova Theater in NYC. That play was Be a Good Little Widow. It had a short off Broadway run starring Jill Eikenberry (L.A. Law).

I saw that show toward the end of its run and something about it just struck me. I couldn't stop thinking about it for weeks. I wasn't exactly sure what it was. The play was about a newly married young woman whose first experience with death comes with the loss of her husband and how she deals with the aftermath. None of what I described was anything I could connect with. I am not a young woman, I am not married and I have been to more funerals since age 10 than any person should probably have to deal with. There was just something. Then it struck me. The play is not about the specifics. It is about the loss of innocence, being forced into adulthood and learning how to cope with all of that. I am making the play sound very depressing, which it is not. Like I mentioned, Brunstetter manages to perfectly balance humor with sadness, which is what makes this play so wonderful. You will be laughing one second and crying the next.

I am so thrilled that TBTA has taken the chance and allowed me to direct this piece. I get to share a play I love so much with audiences who may not know it, but will love it. Four years ago Fat Kids on Fire was a play that I would not have found on my own accord or decided to go to if it were not for my friend being in it. I had a great time at the theater and discovered a new playwright. Hopefully this production of Be a Good Little Widow will do the same for TBTA audiences. Take a chance—see something you might not normally see. You'd be surprised at what you might find.
