A Note from the Author

I did not set out to write a play. I certainly did not set out to write a play that was "important," whatever that means. I just wanted to tell a story—a story that I thought might inspire people on their own journeys of discovery. The story is largely, though loosely, autobiographical. Not everything in the story is factual, but it is true. It is true to life and to many people's experiences.

The story is mine, and yet it does not belong to me. It belongs to every person who has escaped abusive religion, every person who is true to herself regardless of the consequences, every person who found a way to stay whole when life threatened to break him, and to every person who has discovered—or will one day discover—that finding the Divine does not mean losing self. I share my story with you because we are traveling companions on the journey.

About a year and a half ago, after several weeks of summoning my courage. I asked Maureen Trotto to read my very rough first draft of this play. I was honored when she agreed, and even more honored when she told me she thought I was onto something. If she hadn't had the vision for this production, it never would have happened. Her ability to envision my dream brought the play to reality in ways far beyond my imagination. Next came Michael Burnett, who also saw something worth pursuing and encouraged us to move forward. Soon the TBTA Board of Directors was in agreement and gave their blessing and support. Kira Wallace and Jessica Smith helped with the very first table read, letting me hear my words out loud for the first time. Then Meg Jones and Kristin Hoose did more readings for me and were patient through many edits and rewrites. They both have brought openness, compassion, and courage to their roles, blowing me away with their ability to embody the characters. Duane Langenwalter brought his fabulous skills in set design, transforming a blank stage into a space for my dream to come true. Lou Okell joined us as producer, with her attention to detail, her marketing experience, and her genuine spirit. Add a wonderful stage attendant (Jenny Dear), incredibly gifted sound and light folks (Brian Casella, Stephen Cihanek, and their teams), plus those who lent their vocal talents to the recordings, and you see how many people have given of their time and talents to produce this little show. I am blessed beyond measure to have such gifted people working on my play. I thank you from the bottom of my heart.

My deepest thanks is reserved for my wife, who has cheered me along every step of the way and who so tenderly kicked me in the butt when I wanted to guit. I also formally apologize to my daughter for writing a play she isn't old enough to see and hereby promise to write another play that she can not only see, but maybe even have a role in. (You did promise your moms 10% of your earnings when you become famous, right?)

And thanks to you for coming to the premiere production of *Thou Shalt* Not Dance. I hope you find it to be a testimony to the resilience of the human spirit.

IN OUR LOBBY

Silent Witness Initiative

In 1990, the Women's Center of Danbury developed an exhibit of statues honoring victims of domestic homicide, from throughout their service area, since the passage of CT's Family Violence Prevention and Response Act in 1986. This exhibit is modeled after the national Silent Witness Initiative. Each figure, or Silent Witness, bears a plaque with the victim's name, brief description of the murder, and number of surviving children. This testimony, as well as the visual impact of the red statues overwhelmingly destroys any complacency about the reality of domestic violence in our area. The voices of these Silent Witnesses continue to work to encourage the change needed to end the violence.

I Stand With You

The Women's Center also sponsors the "I Stand With You" Photo Campaign. It is part of their Men's Initiative, an agency program involving men of all ages as allies in the work to promote respect and equality and to end domestic violence and sexual assault through education, awareness, and activism. The campaign is based on the fact that most men are not violent; the more visible this message becomes, the less acceptable interpersonal violence will be.

In Our Shoes

In Our Shoes is aimed at raising awareness about bullying and helping people who have experienced bullying to tell their own stories. It was started by the youth of the King Street United Church of Christ after a rash of suicides by gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered youth, as a way of giving witness to the lives affected by bullying, and also as a way of counteracting the anti-gay messages sent by too many churches. Youth who have been bullied can contribute a pair of their shoes to the project, along with a card telling of their experiences. Each pair of shoes becomes part of a traveling display to witness to the problem of bullying and its effects on teens.
